Switch to Canvas

Goals for the 2021-2022 School Year

During the past year, I have gained an appreciation for the challenges associated with leading a center for faculty development. I consider it an honor to lead the Brown Center and look forward to learning even more about faculty development during the coming year and working with wonderful colleagues to bring programming to you, the Stetson educator-scholar. The greatest challenge facing faculty developers is that professional development is typically elective. Given the demands of teaching loads, service obligations and research/scholarship agendas, what can be done to attract faculty to a workshop or pique the interest in a faculty member who is of the opinion that what he/she has been doing for the past 10+ years works just fine"? This is a question every faculty developer asks. Is there a clear answer? No, certainly not. There isn't a magic key, but there are some approaches worth trying. So, this year the Brown Center will endeavor to do the following at some level: 1) create opportunities that are accessible

anytime, anywhere, 2) build on the strength of collaboration, 3) make offerings relevant, and 4) continue to build and strengthen relationships with faculty, and others (e.g., deans and chairs).
