# A message from QEP Director, Megan O'Neill



Greetings, colleagues,

Today I am excited to show off one of several clever t-shirts to generate interest in the QEP. Asking questions is the first step in information literacy, after all: What information do I need? Where can I find it? How do I know it's valid??

I presented the QEP to the Academic Affairs committee of the Board of Trustees recently, describing it as a long-term investment in ensuring that our students have the skills they need to distinguish fake news from actual facts. All around the table, heads were nodding: our students need to be able to distinguish and communicate

truth, and that takes information literacy skills. Think of it as "Bridging the G-A-P," with our students facing the gap between what they might think is true and what they can know is true. That BoT meeting was only the first of our visits to various faculty meetings; if you haven't seen us yet, you will soon.

We'll have a website ready for you shortly after Thanksgiving, a living webpage where you'll find all kinds of information, resources, examples, and ideas, as well as everything you need to participate in the enhancement of our students' critical thinking abilities.
