## Pedagogical Practices: What is Ungrading?

Ungrading is a term for assessment that deprioritizes the action of an instructor assigning a traditional summary grade to student work. While are many approaches to the application of ungrading, teachers focus on giving students formative rather than summative feedback. In addition to dialogue with the student, feedback can, and is often blended with student reflection, self-evaluation and peer feedback. By emphasizing formative feedback, ungrading approaches learning as a process or a journey rather than the completion of a set of tasks or competencies. Interested in learning more about ungrading?
