Dr. Yanhong Zuo earned her PhD from Warner Graduate School of Education, University of Rochester in 2023. She worked as a writing consultant at the University of Rochester Warner Writing Support Services and extensive experience coaching one-to-one writing consultations, hosting writing groups, and conducting workshops on academic writing for students and faculty. Prior to her doctoral study, she taught English as a Foreign Language in Xi'an International Studies University, China for over a decade. The courses she taught focused on English reading, writing, speaking, and translating. As a recipient of a

Fulbright Scholarship, she worked at Quincy College in Boston from 2007 to 2008 where she taught Chinese and English as a second language to a diverse student population. Yanhong's research interests include academic writing, digital multimodal composing, and teaching English to students who use English as an additional language. As a Brown Visiting Teacher Scholar, Yanhong will teach in the Department of English and serve as the assistant director, overseeing the day-to-day operations of the Writing Center. Collaborating with the director and lead tutors, she will provide tutor education for both new and veteran tutors. Along with providing support for current Writing Center programming, Yanhong

will create and implement new initiatives aimed at enhancing support for student writing across the campus.

Consider Completing a Self-Paced Educational Development Course

The Brown Center will again support up to ten faculty (full-time tenure-track, non-tenure-track, and adjunct) to register and complete one on-line self-paced course that is part of the Effective Teaching Practices framework offered by the Association of College and University Educators (ACUE), a national organization endorsed by the American Council on Education. Courses begin March 23, 2024. The Effective Teaching Practices course package consists of the following four courses each of which can be completed in approximately 8 weeks:

- Creating an Inclusive and Supportive Learning Environment
- Promoting Active Learning
- Inspiring Inquiry and Preparing Lifelong Learners
- Designing Learner-Centered and Equitable Courses

A separate ACUE course, <u>Fostering a Culture of Belonging</u>, which begins April 6, 2024, provides participants with evidence-based practices that foster an inclusive and equitable campus environment that mitigates the impact of implicit bias, microaggressions, imposter phenomenon, and stereotype threat thereby ensuring all students and colleagues feel seen, heard, and valued. *Fostering a Culture of Belonging* takes eight weeks to complete and is organized around the following competencies:

- Managing the Impact of Bias
- Reducing Microaggressions
- Addressing Imposter Phenomenon and Stereotype Threat
- Cultivating an Inclusive Environment
